Minutes of NPU-B regular monthly meeting Tuesday, March 2, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m. by Nancy Bliwise, NPU-B Chairperson.

1. OPENING REMARKS / CHAIRPERSON'S COMMENTS

Welcome, mission of NPU-B, and introductory remarks. Dr. Bliwise.

John Ruch with the Buckhead Reporter was in attendance.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

NPU-B Action: A motion to approve the minutes from the previous regular monthly meeting (January) of the NPU-B passed by vote of 16-0-0.

4. REPORTS FROM CITY DEPARTMENTAL REPRESENTATIVES, ELECTED OFFICIALS, AND OTHERS IN AUDIENCE

Atlanta Police Department (APD) Zone 2

Major Senzer, Commander Zone 2, asenzer@atlantaga.gov; 404-624-0674.

Major Senzer attended on behalf of Zone 2. With the NBA playoff on the horizon, the zone has a security plan in place. Even though there will only be about 1,200 family members at the arena, the hotels have reported higher occupancy rates for this weekend to the Zone. The officers are working 12-hour shifts to cover the busy weekend. Other resources will be available to the Zones this weekend, if needed. The Zone 2 focus will be on the bar, club, lounge areas. There will also be a small license and permit team partnered with fire marshals to check clubs and issue warnings for violations, as needed.

License and permits visited some of the Pharr Road establishments last week. 309 Pharr Road was found in non-compliance and the owner was arrested for storing and selling alcohol without a state license as well as issued citations for fire safety and code enforcement violations. The license and permits department has been a great partner to Zone 2.

Property crime drives the crime statistics in Zone 2. The Zone 2 investigative team has partnered with Zone 5 and have done outstanding work and made significant arrests. The arrests have results in a drop in crime numbers, especially in the Buckhead Village Area.

A Board Member asked what the process was for a facility to re-open after they have been found in non-compliance. He also asked if non-compliance issues could be a justification for denial during a during a change of agent or change of owner request. Major Senzer noted that the issues do not follow the property, but rather they follow the owner. He also added that owners need to rent to responsible tenants.

Garden Hills representative George Heery offered to help Major Senzer get in touch with owners near Garden Hills, as needed.

Atlanta Fire Rescue Department (AFRD) 404-546-4400 (or dial 404-546-4421 to reach station 21)

Captain Mitchell announced that Fire Chief Rodrick M Smith is Atlanta's new Fire Chief. There are 36 recruits going through the training program and the City is still taking applications atlantafirerescue.com. Station 21, 27, and 29 are on schedule for major repairs or renovations based on the strategic plan.

Station 21 responded to 649 incidences since the last NPU meeting. Most of calls were for EMS reasons, 27% were fire calls (fire alarms or fires), and 1% were HAZMAT calls. The Fire Department is partnering with Zone 2 to prepare for this weekend. COVID-19 cases are trending slightly downward and vaccinations are ongoing. Most of the fire fighters that are trained to assist with vaccinations, have been helping at Mercedes Benz stadium with vaccines. Remain vigilant and protect yourselves against COVID-19.

Safety tip of the day: Follow safety precautions related to power lines during inclement weather. Report all downed lines through 911 or directly to Georgia Power through their website, or both. Treat ALL lines on the ground as live wires.

A board member asked about underpasses and reports of grass fires under the underpasses. The question was whether these fires were from the homeless community trying to stay warm. Captain Mitchell reported that they had a call this afternoon where a homeless encampment started a fire under an underpass near a natural gas line.

Councilwoman Moore noted that the City is still accepting public comment by phone and the comments received are being played prior to the meetings. She asked everyone to remain engaged with City Hall.

Dr. Bliwise asked if the NPU summaries are given to the Council prior to the meetings. For example, the STR comments were provided to the City. Councilwoman Moore suggested emailing those summaries to each Council member as well as to NPU leadership. The STR Ordinance was referred back to committee for more discussion.

Dr. Bliwise noted that NPU-B has been very busy tracking the tree ordinance as well as the Atlanta Housing Design ordinances that are coming. NPU-B is very fact based and research based and wants to make sure that the goals will be achieved, and if the City engages in pilot projects they are treated as pilot projects. Dr. Bliwise hopes that Commissioner Keene will honor his word that he wants to protect the character of existing neighborhoods.

A board member asked related to the possible changes to single-family zoning whether the concern was City-wide or concentrated. Because the legislation has not been introduced, not everyone knows. No matter where in the City, most NPUs value the character of their neighborhoods. She does not feel that a "blanket approach" will be supported. The ADUs remove trees and she is not convinced that ADUs are going to achieve the goal of affordability.

7. PLANNERS REPORT

Jessica noted that NPU University will have 3 classes in March. www.npuatlanta.org/npuucatalog or call 404.546.0158 is the website to register.

Design Awards 2021 nominations are being accepted and applications are due on March 10, 2021.

The Tree Ordinance is available online and there was one work session but there will be another.

An update to the Impact Fee Ordinance was updated and will be phased in during the Fall. This is an important source of funding for the City and reflects a lot of effort by the Planning Department.

A board member asked what the revenue impact will be from the impact fee. There was a study that compared Atlanta to Alpharetta and Sandy Springs. The impact fee will increase from \$1500 to \$4000 but will still be less than some neighboring Cities. The Tree Ordinance will be presented in the public meeting that describes the revisions and how comments from different groups were integrated.

Dr. Bliwise asked why in the Tree Ordinance there is a reference to small, medium, and large lots instead of R1, R2, R3, etc. Councilwoman Moore noted that part of the nomenclature is to address the variability of lots in zoning categories. For example, an R2 lot could be the minimum dimensions but it could also be significantly larger. The designation allows stricter standards for lots.

Dr. Bliwise commented that the fines are so low that they are not a disincentive. There was a comment that it was considered a misdemeanor and therefore the state legislation limits the fines. One member suggested that in addition to fines, that the ordinance require the owners and tree companies to attend tree school for a half day on a Saturday, or do volunteer hours for the City or Trees Atlanta, or extend the stop work order period (as construction loans are expensive), or all of these.

One board member noted that mature trees need to be replaced with large trees. He also noted that we need to make sure that the trees are not all the same age but a diversity of size and age.

Ms. Williams noted an NPR report that described the true loss of trees.
