Minutes of NPU-B regular monthly meeting Tuesday, December 4, 2018

1. OPENING REMARKS / CHAIRPERSON'S COMMENTS

Welcome, mission of NPU-B, and introductory remarks

No press were in attendance.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

NPU-B Action: A motion to approve minutes from the previous regular monthly meeting of the NPU-B passed by vote of 14-0-0.

3. REPORTS FROM CITY DEPARTMENTAL REPRESENTATIVES, ELECTED OFFICIALS, AND OTHERS IN AUDIENCE

Atlanta Police Department (APD) Zone 2

Major Barry Shaw, Precinct Commander Zone 2, JBShaw@atlantaga.gov; 404-391-0081.

Major Shaw noted that this is the busiest zone and the busiest month. Folks are pulled out of desk jobs to serve at Lenox and other key areas. There are fewer staff in the office due to staff shortages, so there are fewer officers in Lenox. According to the reports, over the past 5 weeks about 35 guns and \$50,000 in cash (not including electronics and handbags) have been taken from vehicles in the zone.

If you see someone driving with 3 or 4 in the car and drive off tags, call 911. If you are going somewhere and you are going somewhere, look back a time or two at your car. They will be in your car before you are in the store often.

The Felini's on Peachtree and the 2800 block of Peachtree has been a target lately. Be cautious. This is a very difficult area to patrol due to the volume of activity.

George Turner started. Nobody knows what that means to everyone. This is a way to improve the flow of people. Super Bowl is Feb 3rd with events the week prior. Police will be working 10 days and 12-hour shifts. The JW Marriott is one of the team hotels. Traffic will be bad for these 10 days.

Alcohol service has been extended from 2 to 4am for the period immediately surrounding the Super Bowl.

There is a new development that people are starting to move into the development. There is a lot of crime where criminals are climbing balconies and entering unfinished units and breaking into finished units. There is some camera surveillance. They would like to have a community meeting to discuss. Major Shaw noted that the problem doesn't seem to be going away. The area where they are is private property so the police can't force them to leave. Police is trying to get the owner with code enforcement violations. Nancy asked what citizens could do to help; could they start calling and writing GDOT to improve conditions? Major Shaw noted that there is a bunch of trash and debris that is a code violation.

Bill Murray noted that there is a big problem with people "blocking the box". Major Shaw noted that it was hard to manage traffic. Major Shaw said that he could put some motorcycle officers on these intersections. Peachtree and Piedmont was noted as a bad intersection. Nancy shared a discussion about a City who hires part-time citizens to support traffic control issues.

The Super Bowl 10-day period the off-duty officers will not be able to fill their off-duty jobs.

Battallion Chief Peal reminded folks to be careful while cooking to avoid fires, especially be careful if you are frying a turkey. Be sure that your fire place is in good working order before you build a fire. People often forget to open the flu vent prior to starting the fire place. Finally, be sure that you close your doors before bed. There are fire retardants in much of the furniture, but once it is burning it will go quickly. www.CloseYourDoor.org/ During the 10 day period of the Super Bowl, the fire department is unable to take vacation and will be helping out.

Z-18-127. An Ordinance to amend Lindbergh Transit Station Area Special Public Interest District (SPI-15) zoning regulations to create a new Subarea Nine (9) entitled MARTA Lindbergh City Center to amend various sections of the SPI-15 zoning district regulations pertaining to bulk limitations, open space requirements, façade requirements and loading requirements; to rezone certain properties listed herein and commonly known as the MARTA Lindbergh City Center property from the C-3-C/BL (Commercial Residential District Conditional/Beltline Overlay) and C-3/BL (Commercial Residential/Bel

A presentation was given by Shocko Warren with the City; Greg Warren with MARTA; Sally Silver with District 7 and a member of the DRC for the SPI.

The ordinance is a culmination of 2 years of collaboration with the City, neighborhoods, and MARTA. SPI-15 is a zoning district in the Lindbergh area and the western edge of SPI-15 borders the Lindbergh MARTA station. The ordinance was adopted at the same time the MARTA station was going through a rezoning process. MARTA was not included at that time due to neighborhood agreements associated with the zoning. MARTA would like to be included into SPI-15 and the City concurs that this is in the best interest with the City. Within the last year, Greg has met with the neighborhood to make sure that – as much as possible – the neighborhood conditions were met within the SPI-15. The result is the creation of a new mixed-use subarea. Garden Hills, Peachtree Park, and Peachtree Hills along with SPI-15 Development Review Committee worked together with the City and MARTA to arrive at this ordinance.

Lindbergh was the first TOD and to address neighborhood concerns about traffic and other issues, these conditions were attached to the zoning condition. One of the conditions was that MARTA would integrate into SPI-15. It was important to be careful that there were no conflicts. The new subarea integrates the previous neighborhood conditions and integrates into the subarea. Sally noted that this is an amendment to the SPI and not a re-write. The most important reason to approve this is that there is a revision to the whole SPI so that mixed use development is clearly defined.

The neighborhoods went through a great deal of effort to get things right. The neighborhoods in attendance noted that it was a good process.

A substitute ordinance by Finance/Executive Committee amending Chapter 20, Article III, Division 1, Section 30-62 Administrative Fee Amounts – Tax Rate Structure of the City of Atlanta Code of Ordinances to increase certain fees related to occupational and business licensing; and to direct that the revenue from the fees be deposited into the accounts set forth herein; and for other purposes.

The NPU discussed and commented on this previously.

18-O-1322 (Information Only)

An Ordinance by Councilmember Michael Julian Bond, Jennifer N. Ide, Dustin Hillis, Matt Westmoreland, and Andre Dickens as substituted by Public Safety and Legal Administration Committee. An Ordinance to amend Chapter 150, (Traffic and Vehicles), of the Atlanta City

Code of Ordinances to create a new Article X to be entitled "Shareable Dockless Mobility Devices" to establish regulations related to shareable mobility devices; and for other purposes.

The NPU discussed that it appears this ordinance establishes a relationship between the companies that rent these scooters and the City of Atlanta in order to push the burden of compliance to the companies. There was a discussion regarding making sure that the person renting the scooter can be tracked, i.e., no payment with cash cards. There should also be a minimum age and rules that a single rider per scooter. There are also concerns about the equivalency of a car and a bike... and are the scooters now also treated as equivalents. There are some concerns about banning them from sidewalks; as streets with grates and potholes are very hard on a scooter. There was general consensus that the scooters are important for last mile connectivity.

CONDITIONS

Applicant seeks a variance from the zoning ordinance to (1) reduce the required west side yard from 10 feet to 5 feet. (2) To reduce the required east yard setback from 10 feet to 5 feet, (3) to exceed lot coverage in the required front yard from one-third (30%) of the front yard to 39% of the required front yard (4) to exceed the lot coverage on the lot from 40% to 42.33% and (5) and to allow a parking pad in the required front yard for the construction of a new single-family residence.

The zoning committee conditioned approval on no living space above the porte cochere and guest parking being composed of pervious material (to minimize the impact of the lot coverage exceedance). The guest parking was removed so the lot coverage exceedance is no longer. The variance is requested without the condition of no living space above the porte cochere.

Mike Moran was in attendance and didn't want a deferral. Nancy read the zoning request. Kim noted that the zoning committee would like for the applicant to work with his neighbors to develop a plan that is more agreeable to the neighbors. There was additional discussion from the committee. Nancy reinforced the challenge of drainage issues in our region and the exacerbation resulting from increases in impervious area and lot coverage.
